The Antidote to Self-Righteousness is a revelation of our sinfulness

"*My sacrifice, O God, is a broken spirit;* a broken and contrite heart you, God, will not despise." **Psalm 51:17**

"The gospel is this: **We are more sinful and flawed in ourselves than we ever dared believe**, yet at the very same time we are more loved and accepted in Jesus Christ than we ever dared hope." - Tim Keller

The Tax Collector:

- Recognized his sin
- Recognized his unworthiness
- Relied on God's mercy/kindness

During this Lenten season let's not trust in ourselves but humble ourselves and pray: **Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!**
